Picnic and Annual Meeting June 8 at 11:30

Plan to join us for a picnic and annual meeting June 8. at 11:30. We plan to choose a location with a shelter house and adequate tables to allow for social distancing, and a short walk from the parking area. Local parks typically work on a first come, first served basis unless reserved for a fee. Choosing a park with more than one shelter house would help us improve the odds of at least one shelter house being available. Bring your own brown bag lunch or appointing a lunch committee are both possibilities to be discussed April 13. A backup plan in case rain is in the forecast will also be discussed. Some park suggestions include Raccoon River Valley Park in West Des Moines (4 shelter houses, restrooms, close to parking area), McHenry Park (2 shelters -one close, one far), Terra Park in Johnston (1 large shelter and 2 small), restrooms), Pete Crivaro Park (2 shelters, restrooms), Walker Johnson Park in Urbandale (shelter with 8-10 tables, restrooms). Vote in the AAUW Election April 7—May 17

There is an AAUW election this spring, and all AAUW members are eligible to vote. This election includes a bylaws change to remove the degree requirement, and a vote on 2021-23 Public Policy Priorities. Voting will open April 7, 2021, and close May 17, 2021. You are encouraged to vote online, but you may request a paper ballot before April 16. You may find information about their rationale in the Open Membership Toolkit. From the Board of Directors:

"The AAUW National Board of Directors strongly supports elimination of the degree requirement for membership and will put the requirement up for a membership vote this spring. This important change is a critical step in bringing AAUW's bylaws and membership requirement in line with our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. While AAUW is fiercely committed to the educational attainment of all women, given our commitment to inclusion, this is simply the right thing to do."
