Voting in the AAUW Election Is Open Until May 17

There is an AAUW election this spring, and all AAUW members are encouraged to vote. This election includes a bylaws change to remove the degree requirement, and a vote on 2021-23 Public Policy Priorities. Voting will close May 17, 2021. Voting information was emailed to members by Shannon Wolfe, AAUW. That email included a link to take you to the AAUW website, your AAUW Member ID, and your voter PIN. If you have not yet voted, you may search your emails for Shannon Wolfe. Each member has her own unique member ID and voter PIN, so it will not work to have another member forward her email to you. Member Survey Results

Eleven members responded to the survey. Results are summarized below.

- 1. What time of day works best for meetings?
 Responses varied, but the most votes went for late afternoon, about 5:30, mid-afternoon, about 3:00, and early evening, about 7:00.
